The web includes more than the present; it includes the past. Church is an important agency by which great traditions become living presences within the community.

Church is the communal celebration of our elemental joys and sorrows, of our gains and losses, of great meanings. The church is for taking these elemental qualities and values of everyday life and of weaving them into the very liturgy of the community.

You might be a Spirit Play Natural if...

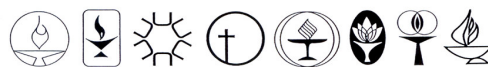

- You are interested in rituals; you like to find “freedom within structure”
- You might enjoy crafting, which is not required, but for those who are interested, there are many opportunities to craft story art that will be cherished for many years to come at UUC
- You are available 2 Sundays per month, at 9:15 a.m. or 11:15 a.m. for about 1^{1/2} hours

SOUL WORK ANTI-RACISM GROUP

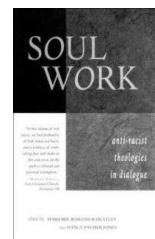

FALL HARVEST OPEN HOUSE Sunday, November 13th

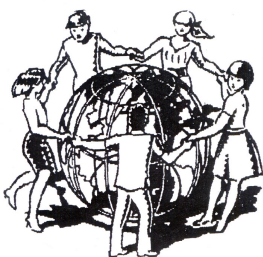

Social Justice in Action

UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST SERVICE COMMITTEE

Haiti is the *House of Despair*. Most of us know Haiti as the site of the terrible 2010 hurricane that devastated much of the country, including the major city, Port au Prince. But Haiti's despair is not new. It has a long history of extreme poverty, joblessness, and lack of education.



Haiti mainly progresses into new states of despair. In recent years, most of the trees have been cut for burning, leaving a depleted and unstable agricultural base. The government, never very effective, has virtually disappeared.

Is there hope? Perhaps yes, perhaps no. But the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) keeps trying. Consistent with UU values, it continues to work actively in Haiti, trying to help empower the population to deal with its problems, and to alert those of good will on the outside to Haiti's need for help.

UUSC supporters in our church should be aware of a couple of projects.

First, UUSC is working with its Haitian partner, the Papaye Peasant Movement (MPP), to build an eco-village project, a new model for economic and environmental sustainability. Through week-long JustWorks camps, UUSC American volunteers will help build homes, support youths, learn about MPP's sustainable agriculture and reforestation projects, and meet inspiring Haitian activists. Second, UUSC is trying to encourage native industry that has the potential for export. One possibility is artwork, which in Haiti has a unique, intriguing quality. Linda McKim-Bell, the Northwest Regional UUSC coordinator, has become an expert on Haitian art. She will hold a free workshop at 1:00 p.m., Sunday, November 13th in the Knatvold Room. Lunch will be served; donation welcomed. Linda will talk about UUSC work in Haiti, the history of Haitian art, and the current potential of developing the Haitian art market, especially among young adults.

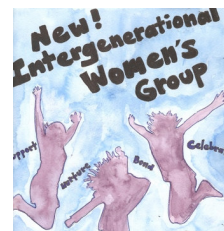
