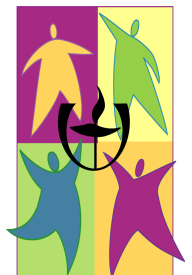

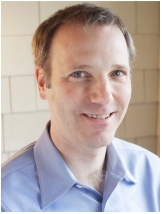

Notes from the Office

On this fall's edition of "This Old Church," I thought I'd take some column inches in the Gateway to describe the state of various building projects and maintenance that members may have an occasion to notice. Some more than others.

The Pipe Organ

On Sunday, October 9th, those attending the service were treated to an unusual sound coming from the choir loft: the pipe organ! As Karen Thomas can explain in great detail, a significant amount of time, repair, and research went into this project, which started in mid-summer and went past our expected date of Homecoming Sunday. Fortunately, we engaged a marvelous group of professionals to do the work who took great care and pride in their results, without passing on any additional cost to the church (specifically, the designated Music Program Fund) for the increased time involved. We appreciate everyone's patience with this project, and hope that you will welcome back this great addition to our worship experience.



The Sanctuary North Exit Doors

Our members, friends, and visitors may also notice that the double exit doors at the north end of the sanctuary have been replaced. The original doors had been damaged multiple times over 50 years by water and wear on the closing hardware, handles, and latching mechanisms. With new doors in place, they are safer to use and more attractive, and the replacement allowed us to fix some issues with water damage that had been compounding with the original installation. Over the next few weeks, we'll be painting the doors and the surrounding plaster to finish the job. We also engaged the contractor who did this work to replace the door on the Pennell meeting room downstairs. This door had been badly damaged at some point last year, and needed to be replaced to function correctly and safely. We will stain this door in the coming weeks.

The Sound System

The sound system in the sanctuary is an important part of everyone's experience of worship services. It has also been a notorious source of problems. We took important steps toward cor-

recting those problems with two work items in August. First, we had a sound technician replace the high-frequency drivers in the PA speakers. These drivers had been completely blown out by feedback stress at some point in the past year (two years? three? Hard to say.), and as a result we've been listening to low-frequency sound only for some time. Restoring the high-frequency range greatly improves the clarity and quality of the sound. Second, we had the technician replace the microphone connectors and test all wires to reduce the possible sources of feedback that had damaged the system in the first place. But we are also required to use the system correctly to avoid these problems happening again in future.

One of the results of these changes is that all of us on the audio volunteer team need to relearn the panel settings for our microphones to get the best sound quality out of the repaired system. This is taking some time to get everyone used to, and we are learning as quickly as we can. If you still experience uncomfortable noise during services, we apologize and ask that you please let a Sunday audio volunteer know so we can track down the cause. Thank you for your help and patience as we try to deliver a better Sunday experience for everyone.

The Wheelchair Lift

As I write, the needed repairs to our wheelchair lift are being completed in time for events and services on the weekend of October 15th and 16th. We are very sorry for the inconvenience this has presented to our members while it has been out of service, and that it has taken this long to get it back in operation. Unfortunately, when the failure was

discovered, contact with our former repair service revealed that they no longer service wheelchair lifts, only commercial elevators.

After an appointment with a vendor in Snohomish county who does wheelchair lift repair in the Puget Sound region, we were able to schedule a visit to determine the point of failure. This turned out to be the batteries that power the entire system (charged from our electrical service), which had not been inspected since the installation in 2001. They have now been replaced. As a result, not only do we have a functioning lift, we have information and contacts to pursue for arranging regular test and service intervals. This, I hope, will help us keep the lift in proper functioning order in the future.

The Sanctuary/Classroom Furnace Project

Last, but certainly not least, I need to provide an update on the sanctuary furnace project. As members and friends will remember, we have had the replacement of our original 1959 air-handler, the newer 1980s-era furnaces, and the now obsolete pneumatic control system with a more modern and efficient setup. While we have had the designated capital funds on hand to pursue this project since the fall of 2010, a number of planning and coordination issues have come up that have delayed the project. Working with our engineering design firm, we submitted plans for permits in late March and only got them back in late April to pass along to five contracting firms for bids on this commercial HVAC project.

A key assumption that broke down was that starting the process in April would be plenty of time to engage a contractor to complete the work before September. This proved false. Three of the five contractors were already completely engaged on summer projects at schools and hospitals and could not consider beginning a new job until September. By indicating that we would consider pushing the project out, we got three contractors to agree to submit bids. Those bids are just finally coming in now in October.

Now, here's the sticky part. This is a working commercial building, seven days a week. Removing the heat and ventilation from the building is a bid deal, especially in the fall and winter months. Also, state regulations have strict requirements about HVAC systems in schools and childcare facilities, and because we rent to a full-day preschool (Wedgwood Montessori), we must be careful about the timing of such significant work. August 2011 was the best time, and that has passed us up. Our next best opportunity is mid-April 2012, or barring that, late June 2012.

So our revised plan is the following: We will continue to work this fall with the contractors to select the best bid, negotiate corrections and amendments to the bid to ensure it can be completed within our budget, and prepare a calendar of work that best matches the windows of opportunity in our building use schedule. In the meantime, we will continue to maintain the existing system and use it to the best of its ability to ventilate and heat the building during the fall and winter months.

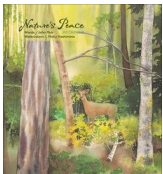

POSITION: Director of Intergenerational Choir

DESCRIPTION/SCOPE: The Director of the Intergenerational Choir is responsible for leadership of the Intergenerational Choir, a multi-age (pre-school through adult) volunteer choir which rehearses once per week and sings for services once per month. Service repertoire includes both sacred and secular music.

The Director also works with children and youth in the church school on Sunday mornings, providing song leadership.

SPECIFIC DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Recruit, direct and rehearse the multi-age Intergenerational Choir (IGC). The choir rehearses for one (occasionally two) hours on Monday evenings from September through May, and participates in two Sunday services on the third Sunday of most months and for some special services (including December 23 evening service, and the first Sunday of June.) Total number of service dates averages ten per year.
- Maintain the choir's music library. Research and purchase music, as needed, within budget specifications.
- Work collaboratively with IGC accompanist. Accompany rehearsals or lead vocally in absence of accompanist.
- In addition to preparing the choir to perform service music, the director will incorporate instruction in basic musicianship skills into the weekly rehearsals.
- Work closely with the Director of Music to provide well-coordinated worship services.
- Provide a qualified substitute for any Sunday services, special services or rehearsals for which s/he is unavailable. It will be the responsibility of the Intergenerational Choir Director to provide payment to such substitutes at rates established by the church.
- In conjunction with the Director of Music and the Director of Religious Education, provide song leadership for children and youth in the church school on most Sunday mornings from mid-September through May. This could also include instruction in basic musicianship skills and singing technique for children.

QUALIFICATIONS:

- Four-year college or university degree in music, or equivalent professional training and experience
- Experience as a choral director or music educator, and experience working with children
- Vocal training and/or music education training
- Piano or guitar accompanying skills
- Ability to work with children, youth and amateur musicians of many ages in a supportive environment
- Strong interpersonal skills, including flexibility, humor, willingness to work with singers of different skill levels and temperaments
- Good organizational and time management skills
- Knowledge of standard children's choir repertoire
- Ability to work as part of a music staff team
- Experience in choral arranging is desirable

- Estimated hours required to fulfill the position is 9 to 10 hours per week, averaged over 12 months (the majority of work hours are Sept-May). Evening and weekend hours required.
